

Pennyroyal and Gerke recently challenged each other to a game of Battleship. The an-


math lesson about coordinate pairs; classes use smart-boards, Google docs, and inter-school phones to communicate and display the battle field.

News from Gerke







Gerke students and their families recently enjoyed time together doing math activities. They also had a chance to enjoy the book fair!





PBL is a teaching method in which students work an extended

Their students worked in teams with specific roles and jobs. Then, each team presented their project to their peers, as well as to a panel of judges consisting of several district administrators and Schenck staff. The three finalist

Project-Based Learning at Anthony Wayne



Teachers throughout the school district took field trips to schools implementing PBL and attended rigorous training

provided through the Buck Institute for Education to learn how to plan and deliver a successful learning experience for our students. According to the Buck Institute for Education, "PBL blends content mastery, meaningful work, and personal connection to create powerful learning experiences..."

So far, AW second and grade teachers have provided students with extraordinary PBL experiences. Second graders worked in teams to research schools around the world. They

presented their findings and ideas on ways their research could make Anthony Wayne a better school to a panel of sixth grade students who had completed two PBL learning experiences. The sixth graders coached and gave feedback






to the students in preparation for the their official presentation to a panel of leaders from our school district and community!

As I look back on my time as a Wildcat, I think of all the teachers, coaches, and friends that helped shape and influence my life's choices and I am forever grateful. Franklin established the Student Achievement Award in January 2001 to honor students who have demonstrated exceptional achievement in academics, community service, or character. Hundreds of students have been honored since the award's inception.

FHS teacher selected as James Madison Fellow

Lucas George, a first year FHS teacher, has been selected as Ohio's only 2019 recipient of a James Madison Fellow-

ship, and one of only 52 in the country. The fellowship offers up to \$24,000 to individuals who want to become outstanding secondary school teachers of the American Constitution.

Congress established the Alexandria, VA-based James Madison Memorial Fellowship Foundation in 1986 to improve instruction about the US Constitution.

In addition to the funds provided for master's degree study, recipients are offered the opportunity to attend a six -week teaching institute in Washington, D.C.

Job Opportunities Beyond High School

A recent two-day JOB (job opportunities beyond high school) fair at Franklin High School allowed students to interact one-on-one with representatives from several area companies who had entry-level openings for students just out of high school. Students signed up for interviews with those that they found intriguing.

Representatives were on hand from a range of employers including AK Steel, Otterbein Senior Living, ADVICS, Patrick Staffing, the US Census, Waffle House, Greenpoint Metals, HiTek Manufacturing, GMI, High Concrete Group LLC, Atrium Medical Center, and E-Beam Services.
