District Update

Superintendent's Message

reetings from Franklin City Schools! We have a very successful year behind us — one that was full of learning, honors, and achievement for our students — and we are eager for the 2019-2020 school year to begin. Congratulations to the Class of 2019, who earned a record amount of scholarships from colleges, universities, foundations, and organizations — \$3.48 million!

FHS students and families are reaping benefits from sev-

The Class of 2019 earned a record \$3.48 million in scholarships from colleges, universities, foundations, and organizations. eral programs. The first is a Workforce Development program that matches students who plan to enter the workforce immediately after high school with Warren County companies that have workforce needs. Franklin is one of the Warren County districts who participat-

ed in this initiative, which was a partnership with Warren County Foundation and United Way of Warren County. Franklin students are working with Greenpoint Metals on Shotwell Drive, and signed employment agreements this spring. See the story on the Franklin High School (page 7) for more information.

A second successful program is the Early College Information Technology Pathway, which allows FHS students to graduate with both a high school diploma and one year of a BS in Information Technology. The program's partners — Franklin High School, Warren County Career Center, Sinclair Community College, and University of Cincinnati — signed an agreement in March 2018. The first group of FHS students enrolled in this 1/2 day program last fall.

A third FHS program is College Credit Plus, where high school students can enroll in college classes. Our primary partner is Sinclair, which recently shared 2018-19 data for FHS students. 129 students in grades 9-12 were enrolled in CCP, taking 925 credit hours, saving Franklin families \$149,850 in tuition. CCP offerings will continue in '19-'20.

At the elementary level, we're pleased that 100% of our third graders met the Third Grade Reading Guarantee; these excellent results are direct result of our stellar staff, and programs we've put in place including all-day kindergarten, FastForward, and COMPASS.

Building security is a top concern, and we are continuing to upgrade safety vestibules in our buildings. The vestibule at Pennyroyal was finished this summer; next up are Hunter and Gerke. When those are finished, the vestibule updates will be complete.

Franklin Junior High will welcome a new principal, Tammy Burchfield, who comes to us from Waynesville. Her profile and a picture are on the Franklin Junior High School page (page 6).

fits from the Technology Department's hard work this summer. See the Technology Update article on page 4 for details, and note our social media information below.

As you know, the district is looking toward new buildings. Our youngest buildings (Franklin High School and Pennyroyal Elementary) are both 50+ years old, and the oldest, — Franklin Junior High — is approaching 100. The board passed a resolution to enter into the ELP (Expedited Local Partnership) with the Ohio Facilities Construction Commission (OFCC). This program will allow us to construct our buildings in two phases. A key aspect of this agreement is that we locked in the percentage that the state will pay for our new buildings — 56%!

The state evaluated all of our buildings and determined that all but the high school need to be replaced. We feel that the state missed some things at the high school and have appealed their decision in hopes that they will support a teardown for that building, too, not just a renovation. FHS students among those inking agreements during in-demand jobs week

In a ceremony modeled after athletic and college signing events, five Franklin High School seniors signed employment agreements with Greenpoint Metals on May 6 at Lebanon High School. The event, which was part of Ohio's indemand jobs week, was one of many across the state during May 6-10. Ohio's Lt. Governor Jon Husted and Ohio 7th District senator Steve Wilson attended and offered remarks. Participating Warren County schools included Carlisle, Franklin, Greater Ohio Virtual School, John Lazares Alternative School, Kings, Lebanon, Little Miami, Springboro, Warren County Career Center, Waynesville, and the Warren County Adult Connections Program.

This event was for high school seniors in Ohio who have completed a rigorous career technical program and are entering the workforce in a related field upon high school graduation.

The five Franklin students, who had been working a special shift at Greenpoint Metals for several months, have been offered full-time jobs upon graduation.

Greenpoint Metals, 301 Shotwell Dr., Franklin, works exclusively with Franklin High School on this Workforce De-

Enrolling your child in school

You may enroll your child in school at the Franklin City Schools Welcome Center Registration Office, 150 E. Sixth St., in the Hampton Bennett Building. Hours are Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

For your convenience, and to minimize waiting time, a parent/guardian must contact the Welcome Center Office to schedule an appointment to complete the registration process in person.

In addition to your completed registration packet, the following documents must be provided for enrollment in the Franklin City School District:

- Original Birth Certificate
- Custody Papers/Court Ordered Placement (if applicable) (Divorce Decree, date stamped and signed by judge/ magistrate). Note: If you are in the process of acquiring custody, you must have documentation from the court confirming legal proceedings have been initiated. There is a 60-day legal completion process for the student to continue enrollment at Franklin City Schools.
- Shot/Immunization Records
- Parent/Guardian Driver's License
- Proof of Residency (Rental/Lease agreement, Settlement Statement, Land/ Purchase Contract, Copy of Deed, Electric or Water Bill. Items listed are the only items that will be accepted.
- IEP/504/MFE (if applicable)
- Transcript from previous school attended (Grades 9-12 only)
- Social Security Card

When all documents have been verified you will be directed to contact your child's assigned school building to complete the enrollment process for orientation, scheduling, and transportation. You may also be required to complete additional building forms.

We want to make your child's first day a positive experience, therefore, we need time to prepare for him/her to join our classes. Due to scheduling and transportation, students enrolled may start the day after registration requirements have been met.

If your child has any medical issues that need to be addressed, please contact the building nurse prior to the start of school.

ECC students had a busy year!

Last August, 197 students began their Kindergarten vear at the ECC. They met their teachers and other staff mem-

bers; learned the building rules, and began to memorize the Wildcat pledge (I am ready to show RESPECT; I am ready to be RE-SPONSIBILE for myself: I know how to be SAFE.)

In May, they said goodbye to the ECC

after a year full of learning, adventures, and projects. Some highlights from their year:

September, students had lessons about Johnny Appleseed.

October brought "Hooray for Fall," an evening literacy event for students and families. During Fire Safety Week, students learned how to be safe at home if a fire were to happen, and fire fighters brought a fire truck and ambulance to the ECC. The Technology Department also taught

students how to use a computer.

During the fall, playground equipment was installed on the building's north side, which was designed for both typical and special needs students,



and allows them to play together. The equipment chosen was designed around inclusive playground design research.

December was the first Book Fair for the students, and academics focused on MAP testing. Just before winter break, students enjoyed Polar Express Day.

The building implemented weekly and monthly attendance incentives and classes who earned 95% attendance were rewarded with a dance party with the principal.

In March, students celebrated Dr. Suess' Birthday Week and had a chance to enjoy some green eggs and ham. Some students began to work with junior high students on a robotics project.

One of the last adventures of the year was Field Day on May 10.

To some extent, the district must consolidate, because

OFCC won't pay for a building that houses fewer than 350 students. If OFCC says they will pay 56% for four buildings and the community wants a fifth, then the community needs to understand that taxpayers would

have to pay 100% of that building's cost.

The Board is looking to place a bond issue for new buildings on the ballot in Nov. 2020; the board has been clear that the building configuration that is on the ballot will be what the community has said it wants.

Technology Update

The Technology Department's summer has been focused on projects to enhance classroom learning.

One-to-one Chromebook program: this initiative began with every student in grades 7-9 having their own Chromebook to use at school and home; this has expanded to grades 7-11 and within three years, will have expanded to all students.

Wireless access: several years ago, wireless access was expanded at FJHS and FHS, this summer, the department completed expanding wireless access to all district classrooms plus the administrative offices.

ViewSonic ViewBoards: these interactive boards are a step up from Smartboards: they are very clear, allow multiple users, and have interactive panels. Gerke and Schenck were upgraded this summer, joining the high school and Hunter where they were already in use.


Second grade students authored and illustrated their very own hardcover books. Students shared their stories with first graders on the last day of school.
