Preschool for Franklin children

The Warren County Educational Service Center and Franklin City Schools work together to operate two preschool classrooms located at the Early Childhood Center at Hampton Bennett, 150 E. Sixth St.

Classrooms serve children from ages 3-5. The preschool program has integrated classrooms serving up to eight children identified as special needs and up to eight typically developing peers. Our preschool curriculum follows the Ohio Department of Education Early Learning Content and Development Standards.

Preschool operates Tuesday through Friday and follows the Franklin City Schools district calendar. Morning and afternoon sessions are offered: 9:15-11:45 a.m. and 1:15 to 3:45 p.m.

The cost for typically developing children is a \$70 enrollment fee and \$180 per month.


District launches full-day kindergarten

When the district implements full-day kindergarten in August, they'll fulfill a

levy promise made to voters who passed an operating levy for the district in May 2014. After a year of preparation, kindergarten will now operate on a full-day schedule. Students' days will run 9:15 to 3:45, with 5 1/2 hours of instruction, plus 30 minutes each for lunch and recess. Breakfast and lunch will be served.

The district is adding three kindergarten classrooms and teachers at the Early Childhood Center, and may add a fourth based on historic enrollments.

According to superintendent Dr. Mike Sander, the impetus behind full-day kindergarten is ensuring students are ready for first grade. "Students are coming to school not ready," he said. "Many don't know col-



Sander added that adult interaction is critical to a child's early learning. A number of factors lead to children not having as much adult interaction as they need including TV and parents' work schedules. He noted that often parents are unaware of how much influence they have on their child's learning; many don't realize how important it is for kids to know their colors, letters, numbers, and so on before starting school, and how much children need to develop a good vocabulary through informal interaction.

The full-day schedule, with three more hours of instruction than half-day, will include art, music, phys ed, and computer skills, but the majority of the time will focus on the basics: reading and math. Depending on a child's needs and skills, they may receive remediation or acceleration. Sander noted that it is not mandatory for children to enroll in full-day kindergarten. Parents may apply for half-day kindergarten; students would be in the same classrooms as full-day students and iust leave early.

The state encourages but does not mandate that districts offer full-day kindergarten.

Kindergarten parents are encouraged to attend the Meet the Teacher event on August 17, 3:30 to 4:30 p.m. at the ECC.

Student Achievement Award

The district's Student Achievement award honors students who've shown exceptional achievement in academics, community service, or character.

Since 2001, the Board has recognized hundreds of students for high scores on the SAT or ACT; exemplary/heroic service to others; ten consecutive quarters of straight As; Wildcat of the Year; and other high achievements.

All Franklin students are eligible. The Student Achievement Committee reviews nomina-

tions regularly. Those interested in serving as a parent or community representative should contact the Superintendent's office.

Enrolling your child in school

You may enroll your child in school at the Franklin City Schools Welcome Center Registration Office, 150 E. Sixth St., in the Hampton Bennett Building. Hours are Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

For your convenience, and to minimize waiting time, a parent/guardian must schedule an appointment with the Welcome Center to complete the registration process in person. Contact the Welcome Center via phone at (937) 743-8602 or email at register@franklincityschools.com

In addition to the completed registration packet, the following documents must be provided for enrollment in our district.

- Original birth certificate
- Custody Papers/Court Ordered Placement (if applicable) (Divorce Decree, date stamped and signed by judge/ magistrate). Note: If you are in the process of acquiring custody, you must have documentation from the court confirming legal proceedings have been initiated. There is a 60-day legal completion process for the student to continue enrollment at Franklin City Schools.
- Shot/Immunization records
- Parent/Guardian driver's license
- Proof of residency (rental/lease agreement, settlement statement, land/ purchase contract, copy of deed, utility receipt, electricity, or water bill). Items listed are the only items that will be accepted.
- IEP/504/MFE (if applicable)
- Transcript from previous school attended (Grades 9-12 only)
- Social Security Card

When all documents have been verified, you will be directed to contact your child's assigned school building to complete the enrollment process for orientation, scheduling, and transportation. You may also be required to complete additional building forms.

We want to make your child's first day a positive experience; therefore, we need time to prepare for him/her to join our classes. Due to scheduling and transportation, students enrolled may start the day after registration requirements have been met.
