Gerke's Operation Care

News from Anthony Wayne

MUSE Artist-in-Residency

Anthony Wayne 5th and 6th grade students recently participated in a MUSE Artist-in-Residence program. Students worked alongside their classroom teachers and a performing artist, Mr. Michael Lippert, from MUSE Machine to create original performances based on difficult-to-learn science concepts. Together, the teachers and students learned about the elements of live theater through hands-on sessions with Mr. Lippert. As academic experts, the teachers provided information to the students and artist, while Mr. Lippert directed the students in using the art form of live theater. They created their own live performances to communicate the science concepts they are working to master in the classroom.

This process enabled the students to genuinely experience the creativity, energy, and discipline required to produce live theater! 5th grade students created an original performance entitled "Ecosystems Under Attack," where they learned about habitats, food chains, food webs, and the impact of human activity on ecosystems. 6th grade students created an original performance entitled "Rocktitude" where they learned about the three different types of rocks, how these types of rocks are formed, and even how these rocks are used in everyday life!





The learning experience culminated with two live performances by the 5th and 6th graders for the student body, staff, and 5th/6th grade families. The MUSE Artist in Residency program was made possible through a special grant from the McLane Foundation. Muse Machine is a nationally celebrated arts education organization serving more than 70,000 students and their teachers each year throughout western Ohio since 1982.

COSI on Wheels

Anthony Wayne students explored the Solar System without ever leaving school when COSI (Center of Science and Industry) brought its traveling science program "Astounding Astronomy" to Anthony Wayne Elementary on October 26. The

day began with a 45-minute interactive assembly introducing the students to the solar system. This assembly was followed by hands-on activities during which the students maneuvered a remotely operated vehicle, identified constellations, and watched the effect of air pressure on a marshmallow.

This experience would not have been possible without the support of school and community volunteers. Every student worked alongside parents, Franklin High School students, and community volunteers including Brent Centers from Franklin City Council, Mike Diehl from the Franklin Fire Department, and Chief Russ Whitman from the Franklin Police Department during the hands-on learning stations.

Funding for COSI on Wheels was made possible by AK Steel Laborers Local 534, the Anthony Wayne PTO, and through a special grant from the McLane Foundation. Many thanks to these organizations and volunteers for making this special learning experience possible for Anthony Wayne's students.



News from Hunter


Having a blast with STEM

Hunter first and second graders had a chance to do some hands-on STEM (science, technology, engineering, math) activities.

In Ms. Egelston's class (far right), students experimented with ramps. They used real miniature pumpkins and other small gourds to roll down a ramp. They had various materials to help incline their ramps, and investigated the effects of raising and lowering the ramp and what that did to the distance of the pumpkin or gourd.

In the background, students are using the smartboard to manipulate and put the life cycle of a pumpkin in the right order.

Ms. Johnson's class (pictured near right) discussed engineering and the



types of skills and careers that fall under the engineering category. In the activity students were asked to use toothpicks, marshmallows, and candy corn to try to create the tallest tower that could stand on its own. Students had to consider how they could use the various materials to build something that was stable and could stand as tall as possible.

Top Hunter fundraisers ride in style

Forty-three Hunter students were treated to a limo ride to Hunter Pizzeria for being top sellers at a recent PTO-sponsored fundraiser. The fundraiser replenished the PTO's account after the recent purchase of new playground equipment for the building. The total raised was about \$10,000. The choir is under the direction of Brittany Rathge.




FIHS students visit WCCC Career Expo


