# FREE BREAKFAST AND LUNCH

Franklin City Schools is participating in the Community Eligibility Provision program for the 2024-2025 school year.

Bottom line: All students enrolled at Franklin City Schools are eligible for a free, healthy breakfast and lunch. Families are not required to complete an appli-

cation or pay a fee. Students may still purchase additional a la carte items; the fee for those is posted on the district website under Food Service. The CEP is part of the federally funded National School Lunch Program and School Breakfast Program.

## **ENROLLMENT INFO**

You may enroll your child at Franklin City Schools Welcome Center Registration Office, 754 E. 4th St. (new district admin offices), Monday—Friday, 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. For your convenience, and to minimize waiting time, a parent/guardian must contact the Welcome Center Office to schedule an appointment to complete the registration process in person. In addition to your completed registration packet, the following documents must be provided for enrollment in the Franklin City School District:

- Original Birth Certificate
- ◆ Custody Papers/Court Ordered Placement (if applicable) (Divorce Decree, date stamped and signed by judge/magistrate). Note: If you are in the process of acquiring custody, you must have documentation from the court confirming legal proceedings have been initiated. There is a 60-day legal completion process for the student to continue enrollment at Franklin City Schools.
- Shot/Immunization Records.
- ◆ Parent/Guardian Driver's License.
- Proof of Residency (Rental/Lease agreement, Settlement Statement, Land/ Purchase Contract, Copy of Deed, Electric or Water Bill. Items listed are the only items that will be accepted.)
- ◆ IEP/504/MFE (if applicable).
- Transcript from previous school attended (Grades 9-12 only).
- ◆ Social Security Card.

When all documents have been verified, you'll be directed to contact your child's assigned school building to complete the enrollment process for orientation, scheduling, and transportation. You may also be required to complete additional building forms. We want to make your child's first day a positive experience, therefore, we need time to prepare for him/her to join our classes. Due to scheduling and transportation, students enrolled may start the day after registration requirements have been met. If your child has any medical issues that need to be addressed, please contact the building nurse prior to the start of school.

## **OUTSTANDING ALUMS: 2024 HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES**

In September, Franklin inducted three graduates and two long-term employees into the Franklin Hall of Fame. 2024 inductees are profiled below. Picture at right courtesy of the Franklin Athletic Department.

Chip Bonny, Class of 1981. Chip was an accomplished student and athlete at FHS. He was President of NHS and co-valedictorian. He was an All-League basketball and football player and attended Yale University where he played football from 1981-85 and graduated with a degree in Applied Mathematics. He received an MBA from U of KY in 1987.

After college, Chip received many awards in his professional career including the Masters Club Award

Winner, Champions Club Award Winner, and the Leader's Circle Award Winner. Chip dedicated much of his life to serving his community. He has held many positions within his local church; he served as a school board member and president. He's spent many years volunteering to coach youth sports. Chip and his wife reside in Lebanon and have 8 children and 12 grandchildren.

Missy Townsend, Class of 1984. She was an excellent student and featured twirler for the Marching Wildcats. She won numerous state and regional championships and three world titles. She was awarded a full athletic scholarship to be the "Golden Girl" with the Boston College Eagles Marching Band. She performed at the Cotton Bowl and the Kickoff Classic and led the St. Patrick's Day parade in Washington, D.C. She culminated her competitive career being named Collegiate National Champion and College Miss Majorette of America. She continued to perform after graduation for the New England Patriots and the Boston Celtics.

She began coaching baton twirling in high school and continues today; she has coached numerous state, regional, national, and world champions. She has twice served as a coach for Team USA in Norway and Holland. She has several twirlers

performing with college bands: Virginia Tech, Miami University, University of Miami, Penn State, Pitt, and Boston College, just to name a few. She is currently the competitive choreographer for Purdue University.

When Missy returned to Ohio in 1994, she began coaching the color guard and twirlers, and started the Winter Guard program in 1995. The color guard and winter guard programs have grown to include elementary and junior high programs. The high school winter guard has become nationally ranked and won their second state championship this season.

Missy currently lives in Hunter with her husband Bobby, stepson Aaron, and her two dogs, Cocoa and Mocca.

Peggy Darragh-Jeromos, Class of 1975, is a fourth-generation Wildcat. She received double major bachelor's degree in economics and chemistry from Earlham College in Richmond, IN, and a master's degree in public management and policy analysis from Carnegie-Mellon University's School of Urban and Public Affairs (now the Heinz School) in Pittsburgh.

Returning to Franklin in 1998, Peggy immersed herself in her hometown community. She served on Franklin City Schools Strategic Planning Team in the late 1990s and was an original member of

the district's Student Achievement Committee. Peggy worked in PR/Communications for the district from 2001 to 2004 and returned in 2009 as a Communications Consultant.

Peggy was the Executive Director of Chamber 45005 (formerly the Franklin Area Chamber of Commerce) from 2009 until April 2023. While there, she helped established the Downtown Franklin Farmers Market in 2014

She's served on various boards and committees, including the Franklin Area Historical Society, Forever Franklin, Inc., and the Deardoff Senior Center.

She received the Good Neighbor Award from the City of Franklin; the 2014 Franklin Area Chamber of Commerce Perry Maxwell Award for com-

munity goodwill (for work on the Farmers Market Committee); the 2018 Franklin Area Chamber of Commerce president's award for service to the community (along with her husband Joe); a Key to the City of Franklin for service to the community in 2023; and Warren County Foundation's 2023 George R. Henkle Philanthropy & Community Service Award.

Peggy lives in Franklin Township with her husband of 33 years, Joe Jeromos. Their daughter Taylor Jeromos and their daughter-in-law Lauren Haskins reside in Buffalo, NY.

Coach Tom Benjamin was hired by Franklin City Schools in 1980 as a Social Studies teacher, assistant football coach, and junior high basketball coach. He'd go on to lead both the boys and girls varsity basketball teams.

For a decade, Tom led the boys varsity basketball program team to 127 wins. They captured three MML titles: 1987, 1990, and 1991. They also finished as MML runner up five times. During his tenure, the boys scored tournament wins over Dayton Dunbar, Dayton Meadowdale, Trotwood Madison, and Centerville.

For eight years Coach Benjamin led the varsity girls to 105 wins. They captured two

MML titles and were district runner up in 1998 to St. Ursula. One of his biggest wins came in his first year as head girls coach when they defeated Miamisburg, snapping their four-year unbeaten streak in league play.

In addition to coaching basketball, Tom was an assistant varsity football coach on the undefeated squad in 1985. He served as an assistant track coach earning an MML championship. He served as the varsity golf coach, winning two MML titles.

Coach Benjamin retired from teaching in 2013 and coaching in 2023. His career basketball coaching record is 578-257. He was inducted into the Springboro Athletic Hall of Fame in February. Tom resides in Miamisburg with his wife of 40 years, Cindy Benjamin (who teaches at Franklin). He has two daughters, Amanda, a Franklin resident, and Lauren who lives in Los Angeles.

Jo Ann Feltner served Franklin City Schools for more than 40 years as a teacher, principal, and school board member. She was a dynamic and enthusiastic leader and powerful voice for always doing what was best for students. She believed in working collaboratively with teachers and the community to achieve that standard and left a positive legacy that will last for generations through the students she taught and the teachers she worked with.

Jo Ann earned degrees from Ohio University, Miami University, and Xavier University. She taught at Gerke Elementary, Hampton Bennett, and Franklin Junior High. She also served as principal at both Gerke and Franklin Junior High. She was the lead director for 6th Grade Camp for over a decade. While principal at the junior high, she secured a venture capital grant that led to staff development, which switched from a traditional school day to a teacher-teaming system.

After retirement, she continued to serve the students of Franklin as a school board member and president. She served a total of 16 years on the board and had three terms as president. She was also elected to serve on the Southwest Ohio School board for 16 years with one term as president and on the Ohio School Board with one term as president. Her dedication to all students led to her being named an OSBA Master School Board Member. In recognition of her commitment to the Franklin community, the Chamber of Commerce presented her with the President's Award in 1992 and Franklin Citizen of the Year in 2014.

Jo Ann now resides in Thousand Oaks, California.

#### Board honors students for achievement



On Oct. 28, the Board honored four students who passed the OELPA (Ohio English Language Proficiency Assessment), which is the test that Ohio uses to determine an English

The district established the Student Achievement Award in 2001. # **ELEMENTARY PTO PROVIDES SUPPORT, ENRICHMENT, & FUN**

With the district's move to grade-level buildings this year, one question concerned the best PTO structure: Was it better to have one PTO per building (grade) or a combined PTO for all elementary buildings? The answer turned out to be one. Over the summer, individual building PTOs restructured to form the FCS Elementary PTO. Meetings are held the fourth Monday of the month at 4:30 p.m., in the FHS Media Room, prior to the Board of Education meetings.

Organizers say their mission is to partner with the schools, principals, and staff to enhance the school experience for students. Their goal is to bridge the gap between student and teacher needs and the funding the schools have. They also hope to provide fun learning activities for students.

The group hit the ground running and worked with principals and secretaries to provide recess equipment and activities (thanks in part to some generous community donations); they also hope

to investigate indoor recess activities.

In October, the PTO had a T-shirt fundraiser for students and parents to help fund activities throughout the year. Other events/fundraisers they're planning include a Breakfast with Santa, Santa Shop, Boo Grams, Valentine Grams, and field days, plus some potential gradespecific activities. They're also working on restaurant dine-to-donate nights. Money from the previous PTOs was combined and divided between the grades and a general fund.



Two main considerations were behind moving to one group: First, to prevent the need to change a building's PTO board each year as parents will most likely move to a different building with their students. Second, to ensure that money raised in previous and future years will benefit all students regardless of the building they attend.

The board's structure is two copresidents, a VP/secretary, and two cotreasurers. Each grade has a chairperson who represents that grade/building. The

board manages events and fundraisers for all grades and supports the chairpersons. The chairperson is the direct contact with the principals and works with them to fulfill the needs of the grade. The hope is that they will run one gradelevel fundraiser in the spring to specifically benefit their grade.
