


Father-Daughter Dance

Integrating Technology into Language Arts and Science

Mrs. DeHart's 5th graders have been studying Landforms of North America. As a culminating activity, students used technology to create

Mrs. Bailey's science classes are using technology to research and display their knowledge. 5th graders studied food webs, and students rotated

Board approves purchase for 1:1 initiative

During the 2014 levy campaign, the Franklin Board of Education made a promise to increase the number of computers in the classrooms. At their March 21 regular meeting, the Board took an important step toward fulfilling that promise by approving the purchase of up to 610 laptops.

Implementation will begin during the next school year, as laptops will be provided to all 7th graders and to a pilot group of thirty 9th graders. One or two mobile computer labs will be purchased for each elementary building and the high school. The mobile labs will have 30 laptops each for a total of up to 360.

Students who are issued a laptop will be assessed a technology fee of \$50 annually (\$25 for students on reduced lunch). The goals for adding the laptops are to:

- increase access to technology for students in order to increase their engagement and productivity and to provide authentic, relevant learning experiences.
- allow learning to extend beyond the school day so students may learn anytime and anywhere.
- provide equal access to students with disabilities.
- ♦ increase students' 21st century skills.

The machines designated for purchase are Lenovo 11e Chromebooks; these were selected for their durability, long battery life, and fast boot times. The use of Chromebooks supports the district's recent adoption of Google Docs as the work platform.

The total cost of the laptops and mobile labs will not exceed \$221,000. These funds come from federal reimbursement of expenditures the distinct made to address technology infrastructure. The reimbursement is based on the district's percentage of students eligible for free and reduced lunch.

Attention: Parents of Juniors & 6th graders

The Ohio Department of Health has released the immunization requirements for the upcoming 2016-17 school year. Seniors (12th graders) will be required to have two MCV4 (Meningococcal serogroup A, C, W, and Y) vaccines. 7th graders will be required to have one MCV4 (Meningococcal serogroup A, C, W, and Y) vaccine. At the beginning of the 2016-17 school year, students who do not have the required immunizations will be excluded after the fourteenth day of school per Ohio law. Please contact your school nurse for more information.

Meningococcal disease is a serious bacterial illness and the leading cause of bacterial meningitis in children ages 2-18 years old. Meningitis is an infection of the covering of the brain and spinal cord which can lead to loss of limbs, deafness, seizures, strokes, or problems with the nervous system and death. Meningococcal disease is most common in infants under one year of age and 16-21 year olds. There is an increased risk of meningococcal disease for college freshman living in dormitories and people with certain medical conditions such as lack of a spleen.



Straight A tickets



Franklin supports Madison




