District Update

Superintendent's Message

reetings from Franklin City Schools! The school year just behind us was full of achievement and honors for our students, and we're looking forward to 2018-19. We'd be remiss if we didn't congratulate the Class of 2018, who earned a record \$3 million in scholarships!

Our students' recent successes are built on the foundation of a strong faculty, staff, and administration, and made possible by the confidence of our district voters, who passed a levy in November 2014. When the levy passed, the Board of Education promised improvements in several

areas.

Congrats to the Class of 2018, who earned a record \$3 million in scholarships! The first promise was to make significant upgrades in our technology. This coming school year, we will be completely one-to-one (each student has their own laptop) in grades 7 through 10. Additionally, we just rotated the first set of laptops to the elementary buildings from the junior

high to increase the number of units in early grades. By the year 2020-21, we will be 100% one-to-one in grades 7 through 12. Another benefit of our technology upgrades is that we have achieved the state mandate to do all of our state assessments online.

A second promise was to implement all-day kindergarten. We are in our fourth year of all-day kindergarten, and the benefits of this are evident as our MAP scores continue to rise and we see an increase in the numbers of students passing the third grade reading guarantee. Students who have benefited from full-day kindergarten routinely score above the national average. In general, our students' achievement on national tests has increased each year and our students perform near the national average.

A third promise was to upgrade our bus fleet. We continue to purchase new buses on a regular schedule and the average age of our fleet is trending downward.

A fourth promise was to increase the number of dual enrollment courses (where students earn both a high school and a college credit) for our high school students. The

Franklin is the only district in Warren County to have a dual enrollment course in theater.

available offerings have increased from one course in '13-'14 to twelve this year, with more in the pipeline. Courses range across the curriculum from biology and math to English, foreign languages, and theater. In fact, Franklin is the only district

in Warren County to have dual enrollment course in theater.

In March, the district signed an agreement that created the Early College Information Technology Pathway. This program will allow FHS students to graduate with both a high school diploma and one year of a Bachelor of Science degree in Information Technology. Students who successfully complete the coursework will earn priority acceptance to either the University of Cincinnati or Sinclair Community College in the Information Technology program, where they'll enter as second-year students. This partnership includes Franklin High School, Warren County Career Center, Sinclair Community College, and University of Cincinnati. Another new partnership benefiting FHS students is a pilot program with United Way of Warren County, Warren County Foundation, and others. This workforce development initiative program is designed to match students who will be entering the workforce immediately after high school, and who have not sought training through the Career Center, with good paying jobs available right here in Warren County.

Across all grades, the district has worked to increase curricular rigor and has spent more than \$750,000 over the last three years to bring on new textbooks, both hard copy and on-line versions. Other classroom initiatives include more problem-based learning and STEM activities, and with help from the McLane Foundation, we are expanding our computer programming and robotics offerings. Four build-

ings, Gerke, Hunter, Franklin Junior High, and Franklin High School will have robotics clubs this coming year.

The board also recently took action to increase student safety by adding a school resource officer. Because the district has realized cost savings from greater use of technology and the need for fewer hard copies of items such as textbooks, the district was able to absorb the cost for the resource officer without adversely impacting other

budget areas. This officer will be in place when the new school year begins.

The district has also partnered with LifeSpan, Inc. and Catalyst Counseling to help meet the mental and social (Continued on page 4)

Peggy Darragh-Jeromos is a familiar name in Franklin, because she's dedicated much of her life to being a community change-maker. "My mom's motto was 'Brighten the Corner Where You Are,"" and I operate by that as well. If I have time to complain about something, I have time to help find a solution."

Peggy graduated from FHS 1975, and received a Bachelor's in Economics and Chemistry at Earlham College in Richmond, IN. She earned a Master's Degree in Public Management and Policy from Carnegie-Mellon University.

After working at Sprint Corporation in Mansfield, OH, she returned to the Franklin area in 1998. Throughout her career, Darragh-Jeromos has worked with a number of local institutions, with much of her work dedicated to promoting Franklin's successes. For the past nine years, she has been the Executive Director of the Franklin Area Chamber of Commerce, where she encourages and advocates for local businesses. In 2014, she helped establish the Downtown Franklin Farmers Market, which is co-sponsored by the Chamber and the City.

She also serves as the Communications Consultant of Franklin City Schools, where she promotes student achievements and events throughout the school system. She spent time on the staff of *The Franklin Chronicle* and still does freelance writing.

Outside her professional career, Peggy has sought to make the Franklin area a better place to live for everyone. She serves as the President of the Franklin Area Historical Society, preserving the history and culture of the region. She's a member of the Forever Franklin, Inc. Board of Directors, the group dedicated to Franklin's downtown revitalization, and is a Trustee of the Deardoff Senior Center.

When asked what Franklin City Schools means to her, Peggy said, "I received a wonderful education at Franklin City Schools, and I am proud of and amazed at all of the opportunities that our district provides students today."

Senior citizens (age 62+) living in the Franklin City School district may pick up a pass in the Superintendent's office that will allow them to attend school-sponsored activities, including sporting events and arts performances, at no charge.

Enrolling your child in school

You may enroll your child in school at the Franklin City Schools Welcome Center Registration Office, 150 E. Sixth St., in the Hampton Bennett Building. Hours are Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

For your convenience, and to minimize waiting time, a parent/guardian must contact the Welcome Center Office to schedule an appointment to complete the registration process in person.

In addition to your completed registration packet, the following documents must be provided for enrollment in the Franklin City School District:

- Original Birth Certificate
- Custody Papers/Court Ordered Placement (if applicable) (Divorce Decree, date stamped and signed by judge/ magistrate). Note: If you are in the process of acquiring custody, you must have documentation from the court confirming legal proceedings have been initiated. There is a 60-day legal completion process for the student to continue enrollment at Franklin City Schools.
- Shot/Immunization Records
- Parent/Guardian Driver's License
- Proof of Residency (Rental/Lease agreement, Settlement Statement, Land/ Purchase Contract, Copy of Deed, Electric or Water Bill. Items listed are the only items that will be accepted.
- IEP/504/MFE (if applicable)
- Transcript from previous school attended (Grades 9-12 only)
- Social Security Card

When all documents have been verified you will be directed to contact your child's assigned school building to complete the enrollment process for orientation, scheduling, and transportation. You may also be reguired to complete additional building forms.

We want to make your child's first day a positive experience, therefore, we need time to prepare for him/her to join our classes. Due to scheduling and transportation, students enrolled may start the day after registration requirements have been met.

If your child has any medical issues that need to be addressed, please contact the building nurse prior to the start of school.

District hires school resource officer

Franklin City Schools will once again have a dedicated school resource officer when school begins.

Patrolman Amanda Myers, who has been with the Franklin Division of Police since 2008, will be stationed at Franklin High School and Franklin Junior High School, and will go to the elementary buildings on an as-needed basis.

She recently completed SRO training, which included information on active shooter procedures, communicating with juveniles, and more. Myers will be working with the building administrators on safety plans, emergency processes, and evaluating buildings for their emergency strengths and weaknesses.

Myers said she has no idea what a typical day will be for her in this role, but will be working with the district administration and staff to set expectations. Initially, she'll be walking the halls and going in and out of classrooms to let everyone know she is there.

While she said she'll be getting to know students and building solid relationships with them, the main thing is for her to be a police officer.




