New administrative offices dedicated; classes to move

Franklin City Schools held a ribbon cutting for their new administrative offices on June 26. The offices are in the back wing of the current Franklin High School, and have a dedicated entrance on the west side of the building. The mailing address is 754 E. 4th St., Franklin. See the map (below right) where the entrance to the admin offices is circled in red.

Construction changes are driving shifts in building configurations. **Hampton Bennett** is vacant and being readied for demolition. With HB's closing, and the new high school slated to open in early 2024, the Board has approved these dates/changes:

Preschool will move to **Schenck Elementary** for the '23-'24 school year.

One kindergarten classroom will move from **Schenck Elementary** to **Pennyroyal** for the '23-'24 school year.

The **Pennyroyal Elementary** campus will go offline June 2024; students will be housed in the modular campus (Buildings A and C) behind the 6-8 middle school in August 2024.

This is the last year 6th graders will be in the elementary buildings. Starting in August 2024, they'll be in the current high school, which is being converted to a 6-8 middle school.

Welcome to another school year! We're excited to welcome grade 1-12 students on August 21, and Kindergarten students on both Aug. 21 (last name A through M) and Aug. 22 (last name N through Z).

We're also looking forward to kicking off a very excit-

ing school year. In January, our new high school will come on line, the first of the new buildings in our district-wide construction project. This is truly a once-in-alifetime scenario: The last new

classroom buildings came online 55 years ago, when the current high school and Pennyroyal Elementary opened in January 1969. Dedication is scheduled for Jan. 13 at 1 p.m. Many details are forthcoming; stay tuned! We look forward to seeing you!

When you visit the building, you'll see that the new high school's design includes features that honor our district's past. For example:

- the brickwork's color and pattern are reminiscent of the old high school's exterior.
- archways on the bridge recall the arched windows at the old high school.

- graduating class composites, which have been hanging in Hampton Bennett and in the theater lobby of the current high school, will be displayed throughout the building.
- the bridge between Hampton Bennett and the old high school is being replaced with a much wider bridge that will be formally named the Robert Han-

num Bridge. A plaque on the surface will include an explanation of who he was (a member of the FHS Class of 1947) and why the bridge was/is named for him.

As new buildings come online,

construction will drive several changes in building configurations. See the article above for more info about where students will be. One thing the community should be aware of: For this school year, high school winter sports (wrestling, boys basketball, and girls basketball) will still be at the current high school. An installation delay for an air handler at the new building will require us to minimize crowds in the new high school gym.

Our high school students have an exciting new opportunity. Franklin is now one of six districts to partner with Miami Regionals in their Early College Academy. (Continued on page 8)

Enrolling your child in school

You may enroll your child in school at the Franklin City Schools Welcome Center Registration Office, 754 E. 4th St. (new district admin offices). Hours are Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

For your convenience, and to minimize waiting time, a parent/ guardian must contact the Welcome Center Office to schedule an appointment to complete the registration process in person.

In addition to your completed registration packet, the following documents must be provided for enrollment in the Franklin City School District:

- Original Birth Certificate
- Custody Papers/Court Ordered Placement (if applicable) (Divorce Decree, date stamped and signed by judge/magistrate). Note: If you are in the process of acquiring custody, you must have documentation from the court confirming legal proceedings have been initiated. There is a 60-day legal completion process for the student to continue enrollment at Franklin City Schools.
- Shot/Immunization Records
- Parent/Guardian Driver's License
- Proof of Residency (Rental/Lease agreement, Settlement Statement, Land/Purchase Contract, Copy of Deed, Electric or Water Bill. Items listed are the only items that will be accepted.)
- IEP/504/MFE (if applicable)
- Transcript from previous school attended (Grades 9-12 only)
- Social Security Card

When all documents have been verified you will be directed to contact your child's assigned school building to complete the enrollment process for orientation, scheduling, and transportation. You may also be required to complete additional building forms.

We want to make your child's first day a positive experience, therefore, we need time to prepare for him/her to join our classes. Due to scheduling and transportation, students enrolled may start the day after registration requirements have been met.

If your child has any medical issues that need to be addressed, please contact the building nurse prior to the start of school.

Senior Citizen activity passes

Senior citizens (age 62+) living in the Franklin City School district may pick up a pass in the Superintendent's office (754 E. 4th St.) that will allow them to attend school-sponsored activities at no charge.

Residents should take a drivers' license with them to confirm their address. The pass never expires and is good for any home game (excluding tournaments) and high school plays.

Outstanding Alum: Dr. Rick Chamberlain



Dr. Rick Chamberlain, known to many area residents as just Dr. Rick, is a 1978 FHS graduate, a member of the Franklin City Schools Hall of Fame, and was named the Citizen of the Year by the Franklin Area Chamber of Commerce in 2016. He graduated from Georgetown College in Kentucky with his B.S. and went on to Ohio University College of Osteopathic Medicine in Athens. He did his internship and residency at

Grandview in Dayton.

Rick said that his Franklin education set him on the path to being a physician. "I had a great education at Franklin. Mr. John Hensley taught chemistry and my first year in college was mostly review from what I learned in his class. Mr. Bob Smith taught physiology in such a way that I became fascinated with the human body and decided then I wanted to be a physician." He decided early that he wanted to be in family practice. "During medical school I was good at procedures and surgeries and was encouraged to follow a path along those lines—orthopedics, general surgery, etc.—but I wanted more long-term relationships with my patients and families."

He also knew that he wanted to come back to Franklin to practice medicine. "Dr. Jack Litle's partner, Dr. Stamper, passed away


my freshman year of medical school and Dr. Litle waited for me to join his practice. I would come back to Franklin during medical school and trained with Dr. Litle and helped him as Team Physician during this time for the Wildcats."

Rick says he cherishes the long-term relations with my patients and families. "This is probably what I cherish most, is being involved with entire families—from birth to end of life issues. I have now taken care of kids whose parents were just kids when I started in practice."

When asked whether he remembered being involved in any crazy pranks, Rick said, "In 8th grade my close friend Jamie Wines (FHS 1978 and also a physician at Harvard doing research) and I got into trouble in Mr. Wayne Ellison's science class and Mr. Ellison told us we were going to get paddled. At the time we had been studying earthworms in his class. Jamie and I did not want to miss football practice because we would also get in trouble from our coaches. We begged Mr. Ellison not to paddle us and [said that] instead we would [each] eat a worm. He agreed, but we had to have our parents sign a note (we may have had a signed note, but not saying whether or not our parents actually signed it!). So Jamie and I fried up our worms on the Bunsen burners and both of us ate the worms and we didn't get paddled or miss football practice."



Twenty-three FHS juniors were accepted to the Academy. Students will graduate with both a high school diploma and an associate's degree from Miami Regionals. High school students will have a dedicated student lounge and counselor but will be in class with the regular MUM student population.

The program enhances our College Credit Plus program, creating an avenue for students who want to earn their high school diploma and associate's degree simultaneously.

The Early College Academy is possible because our levy renewed in May. We are incredibly grateful to taxpayers who overwhelmingly supported us. Funds from the levy allow us to continue initiatives that are vital to our students and community: Chromebooks, all-day Kindergarten, this newsletter, and more.

Bus Driver Incentive

FCS has openings for bus drivers and is offering incentives: a sign-on bonus and paid training.

Sign-On Bonus for new drivers: Anyone newly hired as a bus driver for FCS after July 1, 2022, is eligible for a new-employee bonus of \$1,500, which will be paid in two equal installments: \$750 after six months as a bus driver



and \$750 at the one-year anniversary of hiring as a bus driver.

Paid Training: Up to 40 hours of paid training, paid at the sixmonth anniversary of employment as a bus driver.

Interested applicants are encouraged to apply in the FCS Business Manager's Office at Franklin City Schools Administrative Offices, 754 East Fourth St., Franklin, OH 45005.

In addition, any current FCS employee is eligible for a staff referral bonus. Any employee who refers an individual who is hired as a bus driver for FCS is eligible for a \$1000 referral bonus, which will be split into two equal installments, \$500 after the new driver completes six months of employment with FCS as a bus driver, and \$500 after the new driver completes one year of employment with FCS as a bus driver.
