### Outstanding Graduate: Dr. Dale J. Dwyer


Dr. Dale J. Dwyer joined The University of Toledo faculty in 1989 and is a Professor of Management and former Chair of the Department of Management.

He holds a Ph.D. in Business Administration from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, and both an M.A. and B.A. in Communication from the University of Cincinnati.

In 1995, Dr. Dwyer received the "University Outstanding

Teaching Award," a distinction conferred only once upon a faculty member, as well as the first UT "Student Impact Award" in 2011.

Dale is the author of the top-selling SHRM-published book, *Got a Minute? The 9 Lessons Every HR Professional Must Learn* (2010), as well as *Got A Solution? HR Ap-*



His newest book is entitled, *Needy People: Working Successfully with Control Freaks and Approval-holics*.

Dwyer's research expertise is in organizational downsizing, control and approval, and employee stress. His teaching interests are human resource management, performance management, leadership development. He added that his consulting specialties are leadership development, compensation, performance management, HR strategy and metrics, and employee retention.

Dwyer, a 1974 FHS graduate, said "As I look back on my time in Franklin schools (Gerke, Hampton Bennett, and Franklin High School), it is apparent that I got a great education across languages, literature, and social science, as well as my first love — music.

The opportunities I had to build self-confidence, to perform in front of a crowd, and to be exposed to a variety of subjects and people formed a solid foundation for being a professor, researcher, and consultant. I could not have wished for better teachers and schools!"

#### AW Hosts Muse Artist-in-Residence

Students at Anthony Wayne hosted two Muse Artist-in-Residence programs during the first semester of school. The Muse Artist-in-Residence program is a unique and creative program due to its integration of the arts into the regular education program. This program gives teachers new and creative ways to teach students difficult-to-learn concepts through a collaboration with an expert artist. At the conclusion of the residency, the teachers will have a method to teach students a difficult-to-learn concept for future classes.

The first Muse residency was completed with Muse visual artist Michael Bashaw in conjunction with elementary art teacher Karen Roberts. Every Anthony Wayne student colorfully decorated plastic triangles and rhombuses of varying sizes with symbols from several cultures, and included their own creative designs. After the completed color sculpture was installed, parent volunteer Lori Fletcher said, "My favorite part of the entire experience was watching the looks on every single kid's face when they got the first glimpse of the finished project. There wasn't a single kid who wasn't in awe."

Karen Roberts said. "As a community working together,

we can create a beautiful environment."

The second residency was completed with Muse performing artist Michael Lippert in collaboration with Anthony



Wayne fifth and sixth grade students and teachers.

The students worked alongside Michael Lippert and their classroom teachers to create an original performance based upon difficult-to-learn economics and science concepts (force and motion). Students performed for the Anthony Wayne students, staff, and parents to display their excitement and learning!

Funding for both Muse Artist-in-Residency programs at Anthony Wayne was provided by the McLane Foundation through a special student achievement grant.

Students explored the magic and wonders of chemistry when COSI (Center of Science and Industry) recently

brought its traveling science program "It's Simply Chemistry" to AW. This innovative, interactive program stimulated the imaginations of the next generation of scientists and chemists by allowing students



to explore chemistry through simple experiments designed to introduce science principles.

The day began with a 45-minute interactive assembly introducing the students to how chemistry affects their daily lives. COSI's Chemistry Detective solved the mystery of the missing slime ingredients by identifying acids and bases, determining unknown substances, and decoding an invisible message. Students enjoyed hands-on activity sessions during which they made their very own COSI Super Slime, created endothermic and exothermic reactions, and learned to identify unknown substances using chemistry. 

cluded a chance at the money machine and a limo ride to Pisanello's for lunch.






#### Starlab visit

### What's your superpower? Literacy!


280 students and parents attended Gerke's fall literacy
