AW hosts MUSE Artist-in-Residence

MUSE performing artist Michael Lippert collaborated with Anthony Wayne fifth and sixth grade students and teachers to create an original performance based on difficult-to-learn social studies (Mesopotamia) and science (space) concepts.

Spoken rhymes and pantomimes allowed the students to learn complex concepts and to share them with the audience.

An excerpt from the Mesopotamia script about the creation of written language reads:

When teacher Matt Slone pointed out all the donated materials that had gone into the creation of Franklin landmarks, he said, "Without the community of Gerke, we


would not have been able to create the community of Franklin."

5th graders completed a nationwide STEAM project combining engineering and social studies lessons by exploring their community to note — and then to recreate — historic buildings, attractions, or other notable places they found to be most interesting. After exploring the city using Google Expeditions, students worked in teams to build city landmarks using mostly graham crackers, pretzels, Rice Krispy treats, and mints (all of which had



Veterans Day focuses on Adam's Hope

On Nov. 9, Pennyroyal observed Veterans Day with an assembly that included a flag-folding ceremony and that focused

on the stories of military personnel. Several local veterans, active service members, and recent enlistees shared their experiences.



One story the students heard

was about Germantown-based Adam's Hope, named for Cpl. Adam Jones, a Marine who served in Iraq, Haiti, and Afghanistan. His mother sent him boxes (care packages), which he always shared with fellow soldiers. Cpl. Jones gave his life on April 27, 2011, in Helmand Province, Afghanistan.

Per the website (www.adamshope.com), his family says "...it would be Adam's hope that we continue to give to the troops serving overseas while they are fighting for us and our country."

Inspired by the Adam's Hope story, Pennyroyal students embarked on a service project to support the initiative. Students donated items (to be included in boxes to be shipped overseas); students were also asked to write letters and draw pictures to be included. Additionally, the building's annual Turkey Trot raised money to be donated to Adam's Hope.

Outstanding alum: Janine (Jani) Darragh



"My fondest memories of Franklin would have to be of Riverdays — back when it actually took place on the riverbank on the west side of town. The games, the music, the friends and fun made it almost better than Christmas for me, and I'm still proud of my first-place finish in the Cow Chip Throwing Contest back in 1982 (even

though I had to throw that gold-painted-cow-chip-trophy away many years ago)," said Jani Darragh, a 1990 graduate of Franklin High School.

Jani attended Anthony Wayne, FJHS, and FHS. She earned a bachelor's in Secondary English Education and English as a Second Language (ESL) from Ohio University in 1994, a master's in Curriculum and Instruction from Ohio University in 1999, and a Ph.D. in Language and Literacy Education from Washington State University in 2010.

With over 23 years' teaching experience, Jani is currently an associate professor of literacy and ESL at University of Idaho where she works in the College of Education, Health, and Human Sciences, preparing students to be English teachers. She's published over 25 articles in academic journals, six book chapters, and her co-authored book *Reading for Action: Engaging Youth in Social Justice through Young*

Adult Literature is scheduled to be released in the summer of 2019.

In addition to teaching, Jani works with mentors and supports English teachers in rural Nicaraguan schools and in Kakuma Refugee Camp and the Kalobeyei Settlement in Kenya. She was recently selected to serve as an English Language Specialist for the United States Department of State, a public diplomacy initiative that sends experts in the field of English language education to lead short, intensive English language teacher training projects overseas.

Prior to taking the post at the University of Idaho she taught at Whitworth University in Spokane, Wash., and was an English teacher at Waterford and Granville high schools in Ohio.

Darragh said, "Any success I have had in my career stems from the wonderful foundation I received from the many teachers and coaches I had throughout my years in Franklin School District. The friends I made, and the experiences I had, both as a student and through extracurricular activities like gymnastics, band, and yearbook definitely have shaped me into who I am today, and I'm grateful to have grown up in such a wonderful, supportive community."

She's a third generation Wildcat. Her late grandfather. Bob Darragh, graduated from Franklin High in 1929 and her father, Dan, graduated in 1960.

Kindergarten Registration

Kindergarten registration for the 2019-2020 school year will begin February 20 for all students turning five by August 1, 2019.

Parent/guardian should complete the online preregistration application beginning Mon., Feb, 18. If you do not have a computer one will be available at the Welcome Center. Once you have completed the online registration you will be required to make an appointment beginning Wednesday, February 20.

The following documents are required for registration:

- Original Birth Certificate
- Custody Papers/Court Ordered Placement (if applicable) (Divorce Decree, date stamped and signed by judge /magistrate). Note: If you are in the process of acquiring custody, you must have documentation from court confirming legal proceedings have been initiated. There is a 60-day legal completion process for the student to continue enrollment at Franklin City Schools.
- ♦ Shot/Immunization Records
- Parent/Guardian Driver's License
- Proof of Residency (Rental/Lease agreement, Settlement Statement, Land/Purchase Contract, Copy of

Deed, Electric or Water Bill. Items listed are the only items that will be accepted.

Social Security Card

Students will not be admitted until all of the above requirements have been met.

Holocaust survivor speaks to drama club

In 1939, Henry Guggenheimer and his mother escaped Germany after a Nazi Storm Trooper living in their neighborhood told her to "Get out of Germany as fast as you can." Henry, age 11, and his mother eventually arrived in San Francisco after traveling through Russia, Mongolia, China, Korea, and Japan. Their passports bore large red J's to indicate that they were Jewish.

At the invitation of FHS English teacher and theater director Jeff Sams, Guggenheimer recently spoke to members of the FHS drama club. Sams arranged the session to provide the students with context and background for their winter play, *The Diary of Anne Frank*.

Students were mesmerized as Guggenheimer recounted Jewish persecution: Jews' jobs were taken away and shops and stores were closed to Jews until 4 or 5 p.m., when the prices went up for Jewish shoppers. Jews were forced to have their valuables inventoried and anything of value was confiscated, including his mother's wedding ring. "They stripped you of anything that made you human," he said. "They took your life away from you."

Guggenheimer noted that Kristallnacht, or "The Night of Broken Glass," was actually a two-day period when windows of all Jewish businesses, synagogues, homes, and schools were torched and vandalized. He attended school at a Jewish orphanage, as Jews were forbidden to attend German schools. That ended during Kristallnacht when the SS raided and closed the orphanage and set fire to the orphans' belonging. Half of the 78 children escaped Germany; the others died in concentration camps.

His mother, who worked as a traveling saleslady following his father's death in 1928, was desperate to get Henry out of Germany, and arranged for him to travel to England via Kindertransport, the British-organized rescue mission. Of the 10,000 Jewish children who escaped to England to live

with British families, very few were ever reunited with their parents, as most of the adults died in the camps. Fortunately for the Guggenhiemers, their visas came through two weeks before Kindertransport would have likely separated Henry and his mother forever; instead, they left Germany together.


NED growth mindset assembly

PBL project determines Franklin artifacts

A teacher from each grade level has been trained in Project Based Learning, or PBL, and we are beginning to work with students on these projects.

Students were put in groups of approximately six students to work on presentations around this question. This was after they took some field trips to learn about artifacts and our local community. Students presented their findings for their 4th grade teachers, Mrs. Truesdell, and representatives from the Franklin Area Historical Society.

It was a great way for them to learn their fourth grade content in a real world context and learn how to work to-



gether. We are excited for all of the other grade levels to implement their projects throughout the next semester.

We had several STEAM (science, technology, engineering,








Some even were able to program the robot to go forwards and backwards.

Thrive Thursdays attract international attention

FJHS's Thriving Learning Communities initiative received international attention as a Chinese delegation recently visited to see the program in action.

The TLC program, developed by Cincinnati-based Mayerson Academy, supports social and emotional health behaviors by helping students identify their character strengths in order to understand themselves and to appreciate others.

FJHS, in its first year of the program, which they call Thrive Thursday, presented it at the 2018 Ohio Schools Improvement Institute. A Mayerson Academy rep at the conference asked FJHS whether other schools could visit to see their program in action.

The Chinese visitors were very complimentary with how smoothly the program worked at FJHS as they watched the 30-minute Thrive class in action.

One visitor noted that in China, class sizes may be as high as 60 students, work on social content is a new concept, and using data to demonstrate how programs help students is critical.

8th graders explore historic sites during DC trip

The US Capitol, Gettysburg, the Jefferson Memorial, the Franklin Delano Roosevelt Memorial, the National Museum of American History, the National Archives, and the Tomb of the Unknowns at Arlington National Cemetery were a few of the many sites that FJHS 8th graders explored during their annual trip to Washington, D.C. and Gettysburg.
